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bureau of indian affairs bia physician robert h ruby arrived on the pine ridge reservation in south dakota to oversee the health needs of the oglala sioux tribe during a period of significant transformation and change in federal indian policies as ruby came to know the individuals living on the pine ridge reservation and as he grew more acquainted with the stories traditions and cultural systems of the sioux he was compelled to collect his observations and opinions on this tribe considered at the time one of the most resistant to white culture and bia civilizing efforts

originally published in 1955 ruby s book the oglala sioux presents a vibrant picture of the ways in which the lives of these american indians were altered under the influence of the u s government and it details the deep and in many ways heroic struggle of the sioux to recover and maintain their culture and sovereignty through ruby s work as a doctor on the reservation and through this compelling and informative narrative he advocated understanding compassion and in keeping with the tenor of the times in which he both lived and labored change

popular culture largely perceives the tragedy at wounded knee in 1890 as the end of native american resistance in the west and for many years historians viewed this event as the end of indian history altogether the dawes act of 1887 and the reservation system dramatically changed daily life and political dynamics particularly for the oglala lakotas as akim d reinhardt demonstrates in this volume however the twentieth century continued to be politically dynamic even today as life continues for the oglalas on the pine ridge reservation in southwestern south dakota politics remain an integral component of the lakota past and future reinhardt charts the political history of the oglala lakota people from the fifteenth century to the present with this edited collection of primary documents a historical narrative and a contemporary bibliographic essay throughout the twentieth century residents on pine ridge and other reservations confronted resisted and adapted to the continuing effects of u s colonialism during the modern reservation era reservation councils grassroots and national political movements courtroom victories and losses and cultural battles have shaped indigenous populations both a documentary reader and a lakota history welcome to the oglala nation is an indispensable volume on lakota politics

in 1953 young surgeon robert h ruby began work as the chief medical officer at the hospital on the pine ridge indian reservation in south dakota he began writing almost daily to his sister describing the oglala lakota people he served his bureau of indian affairs colleagues and day to day life on the reservation ruby and his wife were active in the social life of the non white community which allowed ruby also a self trained ethnographer to write in detail about the oglala lakota people and their culture covering topics such as religion art traditions and values his frank and personal depiction of conditions he encountered on the reservation examines poverty alcoholism the educational system and employment conditions and opportunities ruby also wrote critically of the bureau of indian affairs describing the bureaucracy that made it difficult for him to do his job and kept his hospital permanently understaffed and undersupplied these engaging letters provide a compelling memoir of life at pine ridge in the mid 1950s

pictographs show all aspects of warfare ceremonials hunting and daily life of this major plains indian tribe during the 19th century includes extensive text about the artist and his work also about dakota history and historical art

the westward drive of the warlike sioux indians along a thousand miles of prairie and woodland from the upper reaches of the mississippi to the lower powder river in montana is one of the epic migrations of history from about 1660 to the first quarter of the nineteenth century the teton sioux swept away all opposition arikaras ponkas crees crows cheyennes all fell away and dispersed as the sioux advanced until the invaders ranged over a vast territory in the northwest hunting buffalo and raiding their neighbors during the ensuing years of heavy conflict between 1865 and 1877 red cloud of the oglalas stood out as one of the greatest of the sioux leaders george e hyde was born in omaha nebraska in 1882 as a boy he became interested in indians and began writing about them in 1910 he has produced some of the most important books on the american indian ever written including indians of the high plains indians of the woodlands red cloud s folk spotted tail s folk and life of george bent all published by the university of oklahoma press hyde died in omaha nebraska in 1968 at the age of 86 royal b hassrick was the author of several books on indians and indian art including the sioux customs of a warrior society also published by the university of oklahoma press

power of the land is the first in depth look at the past 120 years of struggle over the oglala lakota land base on pine ridge indian reservation in south dakota

for the residents of the pine ridge reservation in south dakota mainstream medical care is often supplemented or replaced by a host of traditional practices the sun dance the yuwipi sing the heyok a ceremony herbalism the sioux religion the peyotism of the native american church and other medicines or sources of healing thomas h lewis a psychiatrist and medical anthropologist describes those practices as he encountered them in the late 1960s and early 1970s during many months he studied with leading practitioners he describes the healers their techniques personal histories and qualities the problems addressed and results obtained and examines past as well as present practices the result is an engrossing account that may profoundly affect the way readers view the dynamics of therapy for mind and body

during the winter of 1947 black elk the oglala sioux holy man related to joseph brown seven of the sacred oglala traditions including such revered rites as the keeping of the soul the rite of purification and preparing for womanhood the san francisco chronicle calls the sacred pipe a valuable contribution to american indian literature

much of native american spirituality has been forced into the preconceived molds of western religions this book unlocks the rich spiritual heritage of the oglala sioux black elk the legendary lakota holy man and spiritual leader chose dr brown to create a literary record to preserve teachings of his people illustrations

includes pictures of red cloud depictions of crazy horse and important people and places in their lives explains several oglala oral legends including the origins of the names red cloud and crazy horse explains red cloud s war the battle of the little bighorn and their roles in both upon suffering beyond suffering the red nation shall rise again and it shall be a blessing for a sick world a world filled with broken promises selfishness and separations a world longing for light again i see a time of seven generations when all the colors of mankind will gather under the sacred tree of life and the whole earth will become one circle again crazy horse look at me i am poor and naked but i am the chief of the nation we do not want riches but we want to train our children right riches will do us no good we could not take them with us to the other world we do not want riches we want peace and love red cloud among the oglala lakota one of the most famous bands of the native american tribe known as the sioux the longest and most effective leader was makhpiyaluta better known as red cloud though he has not been remembered as vividly as another member of the oglala lakota crazy horse red cloud led the group for 40 years in war in peace and on a reservation becoming so esteemed and influential that americans began to mistakenly take him for the leader of the entire sioux tribe in the 1860s red cloud was at the forefront of skirmishing among whites and native americans along the frontier in wyoming and montana which came to be known as red cloud s war after that however red cloud continued to lead his people to reservations first near the black hills and later westward after the battle of the little bighorn though he was respected as a war chief it was his political functions as a spokesman of the oglala that truly allowed red cloud to leave his mark over the last several decades of his life whereas sitting bull and crazy horse suffered premature deaths red cloud outlived the other important leaders of the sioux until dying in 1909 at 87 years old near the end of his life he reportedly said they made us many promises more than i can remember but they kept but one they promised to take our land and they took it red cloud is often referred to as a symbol of lakota concession sitting bull is considered symbolic of lakota spirituality crazy horse because he delayed surrender and never entered into treaty agreements with the u s military became a symbol of lakota resistance crazy horse may have fervently wished to avoid white settlers but he s a native american icon today because of the inability to do so like geronimo in the southwest and sitting bull on the plains crazy horse was a chief who fought in several skirmishes against settlers and u s forces during the 1860s and he became one of the most famous native americans in american history because of one fateful confrontation

with whites the legendary battle of the little bighorn during which an estimated 2 000 lakota and cheyenne warriors routed and then annihilated the 7th u s cavalry led by george custer that disaster led the american government to double down on its efforts to pacify the plains and by the end of the decade many of them had surrendered and been moved onto a reservation like sitting bull crazy horse tried to avoid surrendering for as long as he could and both suffered a controversial death leaders of the oglala sioux looks at the two most famous leaders of the oglala including their roles in red cloud s war and at little bighorn but it also humanizes the men who became symbols of defiance and conciliation respectively along with pictures of important people places and events you will learn about red cloud and crazy horse like you never have before

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
